Satellite Roundup!!!!

The question I love to hear is "How do I get started in OSCAR operations?". In my opinion the best way to get your feet wet is to get your feet wet. During the last year there have been several nice opportunities. Several area Hams made their first OSCAR contacts at Field Day, others made their first contacts at the dry run before Field Day. I think some of these Hams have become active on the birds as a direct result of this exposure. If you missed these chances I would be happy to make arrangements for you to visit my shack and give it a try (we'll have to work out time when there are birds in view and I am available). Let's take a look at some other information sources that are available.

It is probably impossible to reference all of the OSCAR resources available on the internet, but here are a few goodies. The World Wide Web offers lots of valuable information, and the links to more information are practically endless. A couple of good starters are 1) AMSAT — <http://www.amsat.org/amsat/AmsatHome.html> 2) Ham Radio NCSU — <http://www.acs.ncsu.edu/HamRadio>. AMSAT also maintains an FTP sight at [ftp.amsat.org](ftp://ftp.amsat.org).

For general ham stuff it is hard to beat oak.oakland.edu. Check under the pub directory for "hamradio". AMSAT also maintains a remailer allowing you to change your email address to yourcall@amsat.org as well as several news groups including amsat-bb (dealing with everything from what's the best antenna for a beginner to what kind of bird should be built next) and kps (puts the latest Keplerian elements in your email box once a week). For more information send email to "listserv@amsat.org". Use only what's inside the quotes. All of the above internet sources are available at no cost. You don't even need to be an AMSAT member! (but I recommend it).

AMSAT is also the best source for printed information. Their symposium minutes are always interesting and often provide project ideas and or plans. In fact AMSAT sells quite a few publications that are useful, many of which are geared toward the beginner. The bimonthly magazine is good as well.

AMSAT can be contacted at 850 Sligo Ave., Silver Spring, MD 20910-4703, (301) 589-6062. (SUPPORT THE FOLKS THAT BUILD THE BIRDS!!). The ARRL offers many publications that are useful for the OSCAR op they can be reached at ARRL, 225 Main Street, Newington, CT 06111-1494, (203) 594-0200. Their ARRL handbook is a reference every shack should have. Check the used book store for a bargain on an edition a few years old. R. Myers Com., has a couple of nice newsletters for the satellite op. They can be reached at P.O. Box 17108, Fountain Hills, AZ 85269-7108 (602)837-6492. Bob has recently started carrying some equipment as well. The one book I recommend above all others is "The Satellite Experimenters Handbook" by Martin Davidoff, K2UBC (ISBN 0-87259-318-5) (ARRL order No. 3185). It is the bible of OSCAR operation.

There are a couple of OSCAR videos available. The only one that I have seen was produced by "CQ" magazine. It did a wonderful job of explaining many of the basic principles of OSCAR operation. It brings the terms used to life with visual explanations. Unfortunately, it may frighten the new user by implying the myth that OSCAR operation requires a large and very expensive station. I hope this gives you an idea of where to look.
